U.S. CONGRESSMAN IN LW

Dana Rohrabacher to visit on Saturday

U.S. Congressman Dana Rohrabacher will hold a get-together at 9 a.m., Saturday, July 15, in Clubhouse 2. Refreshments will be served, and everyone is welcome to attend.



Dana Rohrabacher Now serving his 13th term in Congress, Rohrabacher represents California's scenic 48th District, which stretches from Seal Beach to Laguna Beach along the Pacific Coast. Rohrabacher is a strong voice for lower government spending and taxes. His record of fiscal restraint and pro-growth policies has won him acclaim from the National Taxpayers Union, Citizens Against Government Waste, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Federation of Independent Business.

As chairman of the Europe, Eurasia, and Emerging Threats Subcommittee of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, Rohrabacher is a most forceful spokesman for human rights and democracy around the world.

Before he was elected to Congress he worked in the Reagan gubernatorial campaign and later on Reagan's staff in California and in the White House.

While there, he was involved in the formulation of the Reagan Doctrine. He developed a keen interest in the problems in Afghanistan and, before he was elected to Congress, he entered the country in the company of Mujahideen fighters who were intent on confronting Soviet occupation forces. Today, he believes Afghanistan owes its freedom to the U.S. and, once wealthy, it should repay America for all its assistance.

Elton John has amassed more than 50 Top 40 hits, including seven consecutive No. 1 U.S. albums, 58 Billboard Top 40 singles, 27 Top 10, four No. 2 and nine No. 1. Rolling Stone named him No. 38 in the top 100 singers of all time.

He's known for his first hit "Your Song" and other iconic standards such as "Good-bye Yellow Brick Road," "Crocodile Rock" and "Tiny Dancer."

He is said to have influenced Rivers Cuomo, George Michael, Axl Rose and Kenny Metcalf, who comes to the Amphitheater stage tonight portraying Elton John as a young performer. From rhinestones to sequins, every detail has been meticulously recreated. Signature costumes, including the infamous Los Angeles Dodgers uniform designed by Bob Mackie with glasses by Ray Winston, finish the illusion.

Metcalf and his Elton John & The Early Years Band were picked to be featured on

"The World's Greatest Tribute Bands" on the Mark Cuban and Ryan Seacrest network AXS TV. In 2013, the band wowed a national audience during a live performance at The Roxy in Hollywood.

The group is known for its technically accurate Vegas-style production, featuring the wildly popular music, costumes and antics of Elton John.

In 2014, they were invited back for a second LIVE AXSTV broadcast, the only Elton John tribute to carry the backing and endorsement of Mark Cuban, Ryan Seacrest and Elton's original producer and original lead guitarist, Caleb Quaye.

"Being on AXS TV" made us a National touring act," said Kenny. "It gave us the credibility of a national TV networks name behind us. That instantly separated us from every other EJ tribute out there."

Caleb Quaye said that "witnessing this performance is like re-living infamous shows such as the Dodger Stadium show in 1975 where I performed with Elton. Being on stage with Kenny Metcalf was surreal!"

WNV confirmed in three OC cities

The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (OCMVCD) has confirmed three mosquito samples have tested positive for West Nile virus (WNV). The mosquitoes were collected from Costa Mesa, La Habra and Yorba Linda. OCMVCD routinely monitors populations of adult mosquitoes and test groups of adult female mosquitoes for the presence of WNV and other mosquito-borne viruses.

There have been no human cases of WNV so far this year.

Vector Control is in Leisure World on a weekly basis. Inspectors treat and test Leisure World's flood channel for mosquito larvae. Mosquitoes are largely aquatic with most of their development occurring in or near stagnant water. WNV is transmitted when a mosquito bites an infected bird and then, a human.

Midnight knocker was unmasked as a burglar

It may not be a scam, but an incident occurred in my south Orange County neighborhood last week that bears repeating here. My neighbor, Bob, was snoozing on his couch at midnight, having fallen asleep watching TV. Suddenly, he was awakened by three loud knocks on his front door. So he jumped to his feet, rushed to the door and opened it, only to find no one there. Bob walked around outside and looked around to see where the mystery visitor had gone, but was unable to locate anyone. So after mumbling “must be kids” to himself, he went back inside through the front door he left ajar, turned off the TV and lights and went to bed.

When he woke up at 6 a.m. and went downstairs, he found, much to his surprise, that the house had been ransacked and burglarized. Silverware, his wallet and laptop computer were missing. The mystery knocker, it turned out, had slipped through the front door and hid in a closet while Bob was outside. The burglar waited there for a while, then proceeded to stuff the valuables in a bag and exit through a rear door. Bob reported the home burglary to the police, and was surprised to learn that two identical incidents occurred in the neighborhood earlier in the week. The following night, police staked out Bob’s street from an unmarked car and spotted a man walking up the front of another house carrying a large, empty trash bag. Police arrested the burglar and later found his car trunk filled with stolen property: watches, jewelry, paintings, and Bob’s wallet. No burglar tools were found because he didn’t require any. All he needed was a free hand with which to knock. Leisure World residents should feel safe knowing that crimes would never happen in this community thanks to a very efficient security department. But on that rare occasion that someone *does* enter LW, keep your unit locked and unless you’re expecting someone, never answer the door.

How residents can remain cool in the summer heat

Leisure World shareholders are blessed to live so close to the beach and enjoy great weather almost all year. The breeze flows through the community in a northeast direction bringing cool air from the ocean and pushing the heat to inland areas.

However, there are a few exceptions during the summer when high-pressure systems stall over California, bringing hot desert air.

These systems can bring extremely high temperatures to the southland that can cause heat-related illnesses.

Shareholders without air conditioning or faulty air conditioning units are encouraged to seek shelter during peak heat hours in any of the five clubhouses in the community.

Per the Orange County Emergency Operations Plan, the county has identified multiple cooling center locations in every city.

Clubhouse 6 is one of the locations selected as a cooling center in Seal Beach. In Orange County emergency phase 4, heat warning triggers are met and cooling centers are activated throughout the county.

When the cooling centers are activated, the county notifies residents through AlertOC, a mass notification system used to alert thousands of people via phone, text and email. To sign-up to receive notification from AlertOC simply, visit www.ocgov.com.

The Golden Rain Foundation will also push the above mentioned notification through Leisure World Live. If shareholders have not signed up, they are encouraged to do so. They will receive real time information alerts to stay informed during emergencies and get updates on community safety, recreation, and governance issues.

June 8, 1987 - Bixby Office Park at Old Ranch opened with approximately 270,000 square feet of commercial space. The complex at the junction of Seal Beach Boulevard and the 405 Freeway was the flagship of the Bixby Ranch Co. It includes three, four-story, class A granite buildings.


July 3, 1997 - The picture on page 1 of The News showed Mildred Tuttle as new president of the Golden Rain Foundation. Ms. Tuttle was the second woman president. She served for three years and continued to serve on the board until her retirement.

Home visits by doctors is now available in LW

The Health Care Center recently began a new home visit program, HCC House Calls.

The service aims to provide comprehensive health care services to residents in the comfort of their homes with the quality of care they would receive in the clinic setting.

The program is available to all Leisure World residents with mobility limitations that may hold them back from making a visit to the doctor.

Insurance co-pays and/or deductible rates will also apply for house calls, so the fee for the service will vary depending on insurance coverage.

The HCC accepts most insurance plans, including private plans as well as Medicare, Medicare Advantage, and many Medicare supplemental plans.

As the neighborhood health care provider, The HCC is motivated to help residents gain better access to its physicians and other medical professionals. Over the last few years, the HCC has been working at tailoring the delivery its services to match the needs of all residents, especially those affected by mobility issues.

Residents must first call the HCC to schedule in-home visit appointments. Then, a doctor and medical assistant or nurse, will travel by the HCC House Calls golf cart, to the resident’s home.

They will conduct a health assessment, provide care and treatment, and/or address any of the patients’ health concerns. Patients may be referred to visit the HCC if additional labs, x-ray, or specialty services are needed.

Since the initial launch of HCC House Calls last month, the services have elicited a positive response from the community. Residents who know of a neighbor, friend, or family member in Leisure World who could benefit from the service are requested to call the HCC to schedule them for an in-home visit.

The HCC also offers a 24-hour nurse hotline at 795-6216. Residents can call any time, even holidays and weekends. This nurse line is staffed by registered nurses who can provide detailed medical information by telephone for no cost. They can also assist in scheduling home visits to assist with medications, wound care, blood pressure and blood sugar checks. There is a nominal fee of \$40 for home visit.

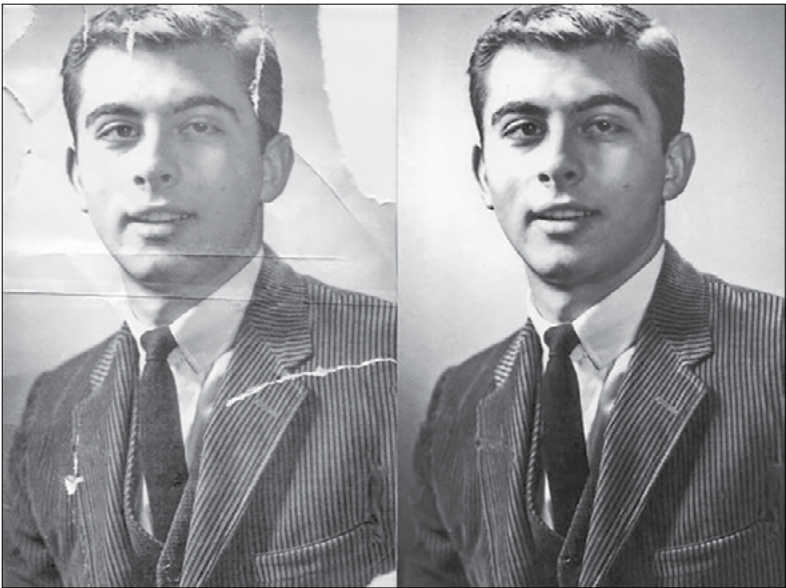

FALW’s thoughtfulness helps develop trust

I would like to thank the men and women of the FALW and in particular Golden Age Foundation board member Ren Villaneuva and his wife, Myrrha, for the wonderful veterans barbecue picnic.

The food was amazing and the welcome to all veterans was truly the one thing that many of us vets never received when we returned from our tours of active duty and combat situations in Vietnam. This is my third year of attending this event, and I am struck by the warmth and genuine welcome

extended to all veterans regardless of where or when they served.

As an American Legion member I meet many other combat veterans who for the greater part are male. At the FALW picnic I was able to meet veterans who are often newcomers to the Leisure World community. I have never met with the same group of veterans at any event, which makes it unique in many ways. It tells me that there is a whole group of active, talented, individuals with special skills lurking in the shadows of Leisure World who could be a force to use in many emergency situations.

Many veterans received a rather dismal return to civilian life after their service in combat situations. Many were spurned and rejected by family and friends for placing their lives on the line and writing that check to trade their life for service to their country. Whole communities negated the service of retuning veterans and turned their backs on vets when they were in their hour of greatest need. Transition services to civilian life were unheard of, especially for women veterans, and many were cast out like abandoned shelter pets. Few

returning veterans knew that they had benefits or health care services available to them under the auspices of the Veterans Administration. One day men and women were in uniform and the next they were on the street often miles from any family or friends. Many service members never knew that they were entitled to compensation for wounds, injuries and surgeries as a result of military service. The only message received was thank you for your service but no one really cared about what happened next.

Since Vietnam many of our veterans have learned that our communities do appreciate the contributions made and the lives that were spent. Veterans place their lives on the line and communities have made it clear that military service has great value. Transitions from combat to peace time are complex, confusing and

difficult. When I look around at my combat veteran peers I see more PTSD and stress than most are willing to own up to. For the greater part many veterans choose to avoid formality, bureaucracy and structure. Instead, many of us would rather come out of the shadows of trauma and past memories by simply enjoying a really good lunch with those of our community who might understand a small piece of what we are about. In a quiet, peaceful, non threatening atmosphere without much formality, we can reach out and slowly make connections with others who may understand our situation. Not unlike the environment in any combat foxhole we all learn who we might trust. This is not accomplished by a whole lot of bureaucracy. It is done by a hand reaching out to a stranger. One neighbor reaching out slowly to a newcomer. Trust and friendships take time. They form over a laugh and a joke, a hot dog, fellowship and friendship.

I salute the FALW for getting it right. The friendly welcome established by FALW makes every veteran feel safe and welcome with no pressure and no demands... just great companionship and wonderful food.
