Work is underway; second floor should be open on Monday

Exterior painting and refinishing the ground floor are underway in Clubhouse 6, which is closed.

The second floor, site of the LW Exercise Room and dance studio, should be open by Monday, Sept. 25, to residents who can climb the stairs on the west side of the building.

Elevator service is suspended during the remodel, and the main entrance is inaccessible during construction. Clubhouse entry will be at the west doors only.

Kathy Rapp, chair of the GRF Physical Property Committee, reports that the interior painting is complete, and the wood floor refinishing is nearly done.

New flooring will be laid at the entries and stairs, and a moveable wall has been installed between the table tennis area and the GAF Hospitality Center.

Painting on the exterior will continue through Friday.

Older age equals higher risk

Many seniors panic at the thought of losing their right to drive and the freedom it brings. But laying down your keys might bring you a peace of mind that supercedes unlimited mobility.

The risk of injury or death due to vehicle crashes increases as people age. In 2014, the last year statistics were available, more than 240,000 older drivers in the U.S. were injured or killed in car crashes, according to the Centers for Disease Control, Motor Vehicle Safety Division.

In Leisure World, Security reports an average of six accidents per month. In April, that number spiked to 12. Most of the accidents are parking related, often occurring when drivers are in reverse, according to GRF Security Services Director Paul Bristow. On Sept. 11, a LW driver accidentally pressed the gas pedal, plowing into a Mutual 14 apartment.

Ways to be Safer on the Road

Take care of the mental and physical changes that may hurt your ability to operate a motor vehicle safely. Hearing, vision and reaction times are all related to safe driving.

• Vision checks: As you age you won't be

able to see as far, which can affect reaction time. Keep vision prescriptions current and wear glasses if you need them.

• Hearing checks: Sirens, horns, and other warnings are important to stay safe and obey the law. Make sure you can hear them.

• Slower reflexes and reduced coordination: Make allowances for slower reaction times. Leave ample space between vehicles and look ahead to see what's coming.

• Manage pain: Pain in the neck can make it difficult to check side mirrors or blind spots when changing lanes; knee pain may affect your ability to reach the gas and brake pedals; and shoulder problems can make steering more difficult.

• Stay focused: Keep attention on the road to locate road signs, pedestrians, traffic signals and other vehicles. The ability to multi-task diminishes with age.

• Other health conditions: Parkinson's disease, dementia and other illnesses may make it impossible to operate a vehicle safely. Speak with your doctor if you have a condition that may affect your

Used vehicles will be sold Saturday

WATCH YOUR STEP

Use caution when donating funds to hurricane victims

Major disasters seem to bring out the best in people, like the volunteers who risked their lives to help thousands of hurricane victims in Texas and Florida.

But there are thieves of the lowest grade who swirl through the winds of disaster to enrich themselves through others' misfortune by asking for "donations."

It's noble for the honest citizens to send money, but exercise caution. Do some research to ensure that your donation will go to a reputable organization that will use the money as promised.

One of the best has always been the Red Cross at www.redcross.org and www.charitynavigator.org/hurricane/harvey. The organization has a proven track record with dealing with disasters.

Consider these tips from the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) when asked to give to hurricane victims or charities:

- Be alert for charities that seem to have sprung up overnight in connection with current events like Harvey and Irma. Check out the charity with the Better Business Bureau's (BBB) Wise Giving Alliance, Charity Navigator, Charity Watch, or GuideStar.

- Designate the disaster so you can ensure your funds are going to disaster relief, rather than a general fund.

- Never click on links or open attachments in e-mails unless you know the sender. You could unknowingly install malware that could infect your computer.

- Don't assume that charity messages posted on social media are legitimate. Research the organization yourself.


Senior Patriots plan peace vigil Sept. 27 at LW



Sept. 18, 1997 - Construction was under way on the new Health Care Center. For safety reasons, a fence was built around the News office entrance. It seemed that every resident who entered the News had to offer his or her rendition of the old cowboy hit tune "Don't Fence Me In."

How to prepare for disasters

Most of us have attended emergency preparedness events in which we are encouraged to be ready in a disaster. We have every good intention to do so, but as soon as we get back to our normal routines, emergency plans end up on the back burner.

Complacency and denial are the biggest enemies of emergency preparedness. We become complacent because we have not had a significant disaster in SoCal in recent years. We are in denial if we think the "Big One" will never happen, even when we are told it's long overdue.

Remember, it is not a matter of if; it's a matter of when the next big disaster will occur.

Preparing for disaster can be challenging, especially when we have not a clue where to begin.

So as a proactive response to Disaster Preparedness Month, I am inviting every shareholder to join me in preparing our personal emergency preparedness plans and survival kits over the next few weeks to make it stress free and easy on our wallets.

Water will be our focus this week. Last week I reported that over 70 percent of all water used in SoCal is imported water.

A surface rupture in the southern portion of the San Andres would sever all three aqueducts that deliver that water. This makes water the most important item to include in our survival kits. We can survive a few days without food but never without water.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) recommends one gallon of water per person per day for drinking and sanitation. (Individual needs may vary, so save as much water as you may need).

Plan for a minimum of three days. This equals three gallons per person or the equivalent of two dozen 16.9 fluid ounces water bottles. Make sure to include water for additional family members, your caregiver(s) and your pets.

You may decide to store water in gallon size containers or the more practical 16.9 fl oz. bottles. Make sure to read the labels on the containers to rotate accordingly and to prevent leaks from over stacking. It is also recommended that water is stored in a shaded areas such as closets or under beds.

The last article in this series will include additional ways to obtain water after a disaster.



In July of 1962, Forbes Spencer envisioned a Baptist Church in Leisure World. Fred Woodburn was teaching a Bible study at the time and from that class came Calvary Baptist Church with eight charter members.

The first formal meeting of that church was Feb. 2, 1964. When applying for incorporation, with the secretary of the state of California, it was determined that name was similar to a church in Orange County. So on Nov. 4, 1964, the congregation voted to change the name to Leisure World Baptist Church.

Forty-one charter members met in Clubhouse 3, and as the congregation grew, the church moved to Clubhouse 1. On June 16, 1965, LW Baptist made a final relocation to Clubhouse 4, where members now remain fellowshiping together as a church body.

LW Baptist is an autonomous group of Christians with no outside official connections, therefore a community church sharing the gospel of Christ to residents of Leisure World and the world with its missionary program, with 33 people on its support list.

Former pastors included Russell Ayres Pavy and Douglas Frederichsen. The current pastor is Rolland Coburn.

Sunday morning worship and Wednesday Bible study and prayer have continued since the first service in 1964.

The church is led by 65 members who serve on the deacons and deaconess boards, Missions, Finance and Social committees, an active parish program and choir.



Check out controversial books in honor of Banned Books Week

If you find yourself thinking “No one bans books anymore these days,” read on. Banned Books Week was launched in 1982 in response to a sudden surge in the number of challenges to books in schools, bookstores and libraries.

More than 11,300 books have been challenged since 1982. A challenge is an attempt to remove or restrict materials, based on the objections of a person or group. Challenges do not simply involve a person expressing a point of view; they are an attempt to remove material from the curriculum or library. A banning is the actual removal of those materials. Censorship can be subtle, almost imperceptible as well as blatant and overt, but, nonetheless, harmful. Throughout history people and groups of all persuasions, for all sorts of reasons, have attempted and will continue to attempt to suppress anything that conflicts with their own beliefs. In 1990 the American Library Association (ALA) started to compile a list of the most frequently challenged books in order to inform the public about censorship that affects libraries and schools.

They collect information from newspapers and reports submitted by individuals. The information is entered into a database and released every year. According to the statistics, parents challenge materials more often than any other group. The top three reasons a book is challenged are:

- The material is considered to be “sexually explicit”
- The material contains “offensive language”
- The material is “unsuited to any age group”



what they do.

The menu is adequate. All the usual favorites are available either a la carte or in combinations. From tacos, soft and hard shell, enchiladas, tostadas, chilli relleno, tamales, chimichanga, burritos wet or dry, quesadillas, carne asada and more.

From the ocean comes shrimp cocktails, ceviche, fried fish (Tilapia) and a mixed tostada (mixta). There is even drunken shrimp (borachas).

The soups are hot and delicious—meatball, chicken soup, fish soup. My friend Rod Carpenter asked for a cabbage soup that was not on the menu, but they made it for him. Served hot with Pico de Gallo, onion, cilantro and red rice, it was a beauty to behold.

The restaurant is somewhat small but clean, enhancing the homey, cozy experience.

Mexican beer is available along with iced tea and soft drinks.

Casa Brito is open 9-9 daily with prices from \$2.50-\$14.99. It is my favorite place for Mexican food—it’s authentic Mexican cuisine at its best, cooked to order and served fresh and hot by friendly staff, not far from where we live. What else could one want?

"The St. Simons Trilogy,"

"The St. Simons Trilogy" is a compelling saga of conflict, love and a young man's search to fulfill his dreams in three books.

The first book, "Bright Captivity," begins as the War of 1812 is in its final days. Anne Couper of the prominent Georgia St. Simons Island family and others are captured by British Royal Marines, which includes British lieutenant John Fraser. It's truly love at first sight.

He later makes her his wife, and these two characters are

covered in all three books along with their families.

The second book, "Where Shadows Go," begins with Ann and John living in London for eight or nine years. Then they return to St. Simons Island where John must learn techniques of planting and harvesting cotton and—contrary to his beliefs—become a slave owner.

The third book, "Beauty from Ashes," continues the saga of the

The author, Eugenia Price, (1916-1996) led an interesting life. For 25 years, she captivated readers with her historical sagas.

ALABAMA HILLS

Mutual 2 resident and his sister tour eastern Sierra site

Victor Martinez, Mutual 2, toured the Alabama Hills Recreation Area and Manzanar War Relocation Center and National Historic Site with his sister in August.

Alabama Hills has a rich history steeped in movie/filmmaking from the 1920s to the present. Western movies, TV series as well as sci-fi movies were often filmed in the eastern Sierra, Nevada, along U.S. Highway 395.

They visited the Museum of Western Film History followed

by a short trip up Highway 395 to Independence to visit the Eastern California Museum.


The most moving and emotional part of the trip was Manzanar, the internment camp maintained by the National Park Service, located between Lone Pine and Independence.

The historic site memorializes the forced interment of 10,046 Japanese-Americans on 6,200 acres of land leased from Los Angeles between March 1942 -Nov. 21, 1945.

Manzanar was one of 10 war relocation centers throughout the Western U.S., which imprisoned Japanese-Americans while WWII dragged on. "Manzanar" means "apple orchard" in Spanish.

As a brief aside, not a single Japanese-American was ever arrested, charged, tried or convicted of any act of espionage against the U.S. from 1942 to the war's end in 1945.

Martinez recommends the Manzanar War Relocation Center as a must-see destination.

CUBA EXCURSION

'Bucket list' destination was thrilling

On my bucket list has been a trip to Cuba. So Joe DiDonato, my traveling companion, and I recently booked a five-day cruise on the Royal Caribbean Empress of the Seas. We flew out Sept. 4 from LAX connecting through Charlotte, North Carolina, arriving in Tampa Bay. The good news is that we got to Cuba; the bad news was that hurricane Irma threw us a loop. However, I always feel that I live under a lucky star and have a positive attitude. It worked for me again.

ability to operate a motor vehicle. In addition to these mental and physical changes, also be aware that taking prescribed medications can also affect driving ability.

Read your medication labels carefully and consult with doctors or pharmacists to see if prescriptions allow for safe operation of vehicles.

Is it Time to Quit Driving?

There are warning signs that point to a decline in your ability to drive safely:

- Difficulty changing lanes.
- Suddenly drifting into other lanes.
- Problems judging distance when braking.
- Forgetting to use turn signals.

A few of the more severe "red flags" which may indicate that you can no longer operate a vehicle safely include:

- Multiple close calls when you narrowly avoid collisions.
- New dents or scratches on the car.
- Missing stop signs or red lights.
- Collisions with non-moving objects, such as fences, curbs.
- An increase in traffic violations.

- Becoming lost frequently or difficulty navigating.
- Road rage
- Fear on the highway

How Do I Surrender My License?

It's important to assess your abilities and have an honest discussion with your family when deciding whether to give up driving. If you decide to voluntarily surrender your license, you can replace it with a state identification card. Here's what you'll need to do:

- Go to your local DMV.
- Fill out a Request for Surrender of a Driver License form
- Apply for an identification card.
- Pay required fees.

Once you've received your identification card and no longer intend to drive, there are a few other things to consider:

- Cancel your auto insurance.
- If you have AAA or other road side services, cancel these as well.
- Sell or donate your car. You can transfer the title to a family member, or gather the proper paperwork to sell it to another buyer.

How Do I Get Around Town?

Leisure World has ample pub-

lic transportation to help people get around.

Minibuses take people where they want to go inside LW, and the city provides bus service in and around the city.

To learn more about the LW Minibus system, attend one of the monthly orientation classes. They are generally held on the first Thursday of the month and are publicized in the LW Weekly. For more information on Minibus service, call Grant Winford, GRF fleet manager, at 431-6586, ext. 372.

The City of Seal Beach has a Senior Transportation Program comprised of the Senior Nutrition program, Shopping Shuttle and the Dial-A-Ride program.

The nutrition program transports people to lunch at the Seal Beach Senior Center on St. Cloud Drive; the shopping shuttle makes runs to the Shops at Rossmoor and the Target Center, and people can call Dial-A-Ride for door to door transportation to medical appointments, etc.

All of the programs and options are covered in the 2017 LW Minibus publication delivered to all residents this year.
