Mosquito risk is low but LWers need to help keep it that way

The risk rating for West Nile virus (WNV) in Orange County is currently ranked "low" as no mosquitoes have tested positive for WNV so far this summer, according to the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District. The mosquito abundance is average for this time of year.

As for other potential mosquito threats, three species of invasive Aedes mosquitoes—the Aedes aegypti (the yellow fever mosquito), Aedes albopictus (the Asian tiger mosquito) and Aedes notoscriptus (the Australian backyard mosquito)—have been detected in Orange County, according to Vector Control.

All three bite aggressively during the day and lay their eggs in small containers of water. These mosquitoes are not native to California and can



transmit Zika, dengue, chikungunya and yellow fever. There have been no recent cases of these viruses being transmitted locally in California.

Even though there have been no local outbreaks of these viruses in the county, the presence of Aedes mosquitoes increases the risk. These mosquitoes are now established in 28 cities and unincorporated areas around the county, according to Vector Control.

The West Nile Virus is also spread through infected mosquitoes and can cause serious illness, or even death. In the past five years, there have been 461 human cases reported in Orange County, including 23 deaths.

Mosquito control is a shared responsibility. Every resident must redouble their efforts to eliminate *all* standing water from their property, including standing water found indoors.

Residents should take the following precautions to help reduce the chances of being bit by mosquitoes:

- Dump and drain any containers filled with water at least once a week
- Clean and scrub bird baths and pet water bowls weekly
- Dump water from potted plant saucers
- Do not transport or share plant clippings rooted in water
- Drill a hole or puncture containers to eliminate standing

To prevent mosquito bites, the District offers the following tips:

- Apply mosquito repellents to exposed skin before going outdoors; reapply as recommended
- Wear repellent containing DEET, Picaridin, IR3535, or oil of lemon eucalyptus
- Close all unscreened doors and windows to prevent mosquitoes from entering your home or space; repair broken or damaged screens
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants, and opt for lighter-colored clothing



WATCH YOUR STEP

Use caution when giving to charities by Cathie Merz

The phone rings, and an automated voice makes the pitch. Perhaps it's a message asking you to donate to a veterans' charity, for cancer research or a first responders fund.

While charitable instincts may urge you to act, it's important make sure unsolicited charity calls are legitimate before donating. Scammers use the same techniques as trusted charities to reach you,

Beware of "sound alike" organizations that have names that closely resemble the name of real charities, and don't be swayed by a benevolent-sounding name.

Real charities need support and lose out when scammers intervene. It is best to only give to organizations you know and trust.

A fake charity might ask you to wire money or send cash — see this as a red flag. Scammers will put pressure on you to act quickly, before you have a chance to think through your decision or do any research.

Even if you like what you are hearing about the charity's work, it is strongly recommend that you do due diligence to research any charity before you give. It's easy to do — check out charities at www.give. org, www.charitynavigator.org or www.nasconet.org before donating.

Give.org monitors 20 standards for charities, including governance, effectiveness, finances, solicitation and informational materials

Charity Navigator is the largest and most-utilized evaluator of charities in the United States providing data on 1.8 million nonprofits and ratings for close to 10,000 charities. Its ratings indicate if a charity is spending too much money on fundraising and not enough for the purpose of the charity.

The National Association of State Charity Officials (NASCO) is an association of state offices, attorneys general, secretaries of state and other offices, charged with oversight of charitable organizations and charitable solicitation in the United States.

Asking tough questions of the charities asking for money is the first step to take to protect yourself from being taken advantage of

- when a potential scammer or fake charity asks you to donate. •Ask if they are a registered public 501(c)(3) organization
- Ask for the charity's Employer Identification Number (EIN). If they don't have one, don't donate.
- Ask about the organization's mission, goals, and history of success
- Check the charity's website to validate their work and make sure to find the nonprofits EIN on the website. Most non-profits also have .org website rather than .com.

It's always your choice to give your credit card number over the phone. If you are at all apprehensive or want time to research and consider how much you want to give, you can ask to have a mailer or email sent to you. You can then give in the way that is most comfortable to you, whether by mailing back a check or going to the organization's website to give with your credit card.

A pledged amount on the phone is only that — a pledge. It helps the charity know what to potentially expect for their budgeting purposes, but it is not a firm commitment on your part. You can still choose to give less or more, or not at all.

You should never be pressured to give your bank account informa-

Making History

- Aug. 3, 1958 The U.S. nuclear submarine Nautilus made the first undersea voyage to the geographic North Pole. The world's first nuclear submarine, the Nautilus, dived at Point Barrow, Alaska, and traveled nearly 1,000 miles under the Arctic ice cap to reach the top of the world. It then steamed on to Iceland, pioneering a new and shorter route from the Pacific to the Atlantic and Europe.
- Aug. 4, 1944 Acting on tip from a Dutch informer, the Nazi Gestapo captured 15-year-old Jewish diarist Anne Frank and her family in a sealed-off area of an Amsterdam warehouse. The Franks took shelter there in 1942 out of fear of deportation to a Nazi concentration camp.
- Aug. 6, 1945 At 8:16 a.m. Japanese time, the Enola Gay, an American B-29 bomber, dropped the world's first atom bomb, over the city of Hiroshima. Approximately 80,000 people were killed as a direct result of the blast, and another 35,000, injured. At least another 60,000 were dead by the end of the year from the effects of the fallout.

GRF Drop Boxes

Located throughout the community are light tan-colored payment boxes provided as a convenient method of dropping off monthly assessment payments as well as utility payments for Edison, Frontier and Spectrum without having to use a postage stamp.

GRF has established strict procedures relating to the collection and delivery of payments deposited in these payment boxes. Payments are collected daily Monday through Friday from all boxes, and the higher volume boxes have several daily collections. Sealed payments are delivered to the Finance office where they are sorted and mailed in parcels as batches to their respective payment processing centers. Monthly assessment payments are forwarded to the lockbox payment processing center via UPS and contain a tracking number used to confirm the package was

delivered.

Be sure to include your name and address on the outside of all payment envelopes deposited in the light tan-colored payment boxes. Doing so allows staff to add an additional step of tracking and recording your payments before they are forwarded to their respective payment processing center. Failure to place your name and address on your payment envelopes will make it difficult for staff to track your payment once it leaves our office.

Note that you must use postage stamps on all mail deposited in the blue US postal boxes. Further, it is always a good practice to place your return address on all US mail in the event the postmaster is unable to deliver your mail.



The heat is on! Stay hydrated

The heat is on!

With temperatures soaring, summer has finally arrived. These hot, lazy days may be a welcome change from the June gloom, but they come with a serious risk: dehydration.

What is dehydration? It means your body doesn't have enough water. This may not sound so bad, but water is critical to your organs. If you are dehydrated, your body won't be able to function as well. And if you don't get water soon, your body could suffer long-term damage.

It's easy to get dehydrated. Your body uses water on leisurely strolls around your mutual. On a very hot day, your body uses a lot of water for the same stroll. Your body even uses a lot of water when you're not moving, like when you are enjoying a concert at the Amphitheater on a hot night.

You can help avoid dehydration by bringing snacks with you when you head outside:

- Fruits and veggies. Some of your favorites are chock-full of minerals, vitamins, and water: cucumbers, carrots, grapes, and watermelon (of course!).
- Drinks. Water is a great choice, but it's not the only one. Lowsugar sports drinks are also a tasty option. Avoid alcohol and coffee, since those can dehydrate you.

What to watch for

If you catch dehydration early on, you can treat it yourself. Stay cool, rest, and enjoy some of the fruits, veggies, and drinks listed above. These are common symptoms of mild dehydration:

- Dark yellow urine
- Dry lips, mouth, and tongue
- Lower energy than usual





The Marschallin has yet another ploy in mind, which is to send Octavian dressed as "Count Refrano" as the rose bearer. The Marschallin then sings about the upcoming events, about her cousin the Baron, about Sophie, love and growing older.

Act 2 depicts Octavian as the rose bearer followed by Ochs on the way to woo Sophie. His ensuing behavior repulses Sophie and in the resulting confusion she and Octavian fall for each other.

The opera is sung in German with English subtitles. No fees or dues are collected.
