On Tuesday, Dec. 8, at 4:30 p.m. at Veterans Plaza, Rabbi Shmuel Marcus of the Chabad of Los Alamitos/Cypress and a member of the well-known 8th Day Band will share the story of Hanukkah and its meaning for Jews and gentiles alike. Musical entertainment will help celebrate the Festival of Lights prior to lighting the menorah. It is an opportunity for this community, rich in culture and customs, to learn and share in the joy of this beautiful festival.

The holiday celebrates the Jews defeating Syrian-Greek oppressors who

Pearl Harbor—A date that lives in infamy

President Franklin Roosevelt called Dec. 7, 1941, "a date which will live in infamy."

On that day, Japanese planes attacked the United States Naval Base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

The bombing killed more than 2,300 Americans and decimated the U.S. Pacific Fleet. It destroyed the American battleship USS Arizona and capsized the USS Oklahoma.

The attack sank or beached a total of 12 ships and damaged nine others; 160 aircraft were destroyed and 150 others damaged. The country was taken by surprise, especially the ill-prepared Pearl Harbor base.

When Germany and Italy declared war on the United States days later, America found itself in a global war.

The annual Remembrance Day ceremony commemorating the attack on Pearl Harbor will be closed to the public this year and streamed online as a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

The ceremony will begin at 7:50 a.m. on Dec. 7 at the Pearl Harbor National Memorial's Contemplation Circle in Hawaii.

A small number of veterans will be in attendance on-site, according to Hawaii News Now.

A moment of silence will be observed at 7:55 a.m., the time

COVID-19 UPDATES

GRF votes to shut down LW amenities | People aged 85-plus are most vulnerable

After opening most outdoor amenities over the last few months, a surge in COVID-19 cases has forced GRF to temporarily shut down GRF facilities. GRF Executive Director Randy Ankeny shared the following statistics that entered into the difficult decision taken by the GRF Board of Directors at the Nov. 24 meeting:

• Number of COVID-19 cases in OC continue to surge.

The Orange County COVID-19 numbers are sobering, doubling over the holiday weekend even as GRF venues have been shut down. Security reported more than 2,000 guest cars were admitted on Thanksgiving Day. That is fewer than in previous years, but still too many considering the dire risk to older people.

Leisure World residents have been vigilant in wearing masks and adhering to other protection protocols. The community has fared well, with only a handful of cases reported. But as case numbers surge, it's important to stay the course until a vaccine is available.

About 25 golfers congregated at the LW Golf Course Nov. 25 to protest the COVID-19-related shut-down of the course until Dec. 21. The GRF Board closed all LW amenities on Nov. 25 because of surging cases of the virus in Seal Beach and beyond. GRF Executive Director Randy Ankeny answered residents' questions about the board's decision to close the course. Ankeny quoted COVID-19 case statistics, noted that LW is a high risk community with its vulnerable population and reiterated his goal to keep LW as safe as possible during this pandemic. Golfers maintain that they have been wearing masks and adhering to the distance rules, and noted that other courses are open.

GRF Construction Updates

LW POOL

GRF projects are underway around the community despite slowdowns attributed to the COVID-19 repercussions. This column will update residents on the progress of various construction projects. The information is provided by GRF Facilities Director Mark Weaver and Physical Property Manager David Rudge.

GRF Facilities Director Mark Weaver received plans from the pool architect that need more coordination to preclude costly change orders mid-construction. Once the plans are ready, GRF will submit them to the City of Seal Beach and Orange County Health Care Agency for approvals. When the agencies having jurisdiction approve the plans and issue permits, construction will begin. The date for the pool to be open is April 5.

Fire Safety During the Holidays

The holidays should be enjoyable, so it's important to be careful when decorating your

year. To ensure your holiday celebrations are fire-safe and injury-free, follow these safety tips.

Candles

- Consider using flameless candles and flame-resistant candleholders to reduce fire risk. Flameless candles are highly recommended by the Orange County Fire Authority.
 - Keep candles at least 12 inches from flammable materials.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets and on stable
 - Extinguish candles before leaving a room or going to sleep.

Lighting and Decorations

- Check lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections before using.
- Replace burned-out bulbs promptly with the same wattage bulb.
- Do not overload electrical outlets with too many lights or decorations, and make sure all extension cords are marked for proper use.
- Plug outdoor electric lights and decorations into circuits protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs).
- Turn off all indoor and outdoor holiday lighting before leaving the house or going to bed.

Christmas Trees

- Artificial Christmas trees labeled as fire-resistant are three times safer than real trees.
- If decorating with a fresh tree, ensure it is watered as soon as installed and frequently thereafter.
- Place your tree away from fireplaces, radiators, heater vents, air ducts and other heat sources.
 - Make sure the tree is out of the way of day-to-day traffic.
- Ornaments and other holiday decorations should be noncombustible or flame-resistant.
- Remove your tree promptly from your home after the holidays. An ignited tree can be totally consumed by fire in 3-5 seconds and generate over 2,000 degrees of radiant heat.

The Orange County Health Care Agency reported 1,666 new coronavirus cases Nov. 28 and 1,058 new cases on Nov. 30, and no additional deaths due to COVID-19.

The disease caused by the virus has killed 1,577 people countywide.

Since the start of the pandemic, the county has recorded 77,819 cases as of Nov. 30.

Hospitalizations because of the virus stand at 597, with 148 of those patients receiving treatment in intensive care units.

These are sobering statistics, especially for the LW population, which is vulnerable to the most serious outcomes of the disease.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, people in their 50s are at higher risk for severe illness than people in their 40s. Similarly, people in their 60s or 70s are at higher risk for severe illness than people in their 50s. The greatest risk for severe illness from COVID-19 is among those aged 85 or older.

Eight out of 10 deaths in the U.S. have been adults 65 years or older.

People 85-plus are 13 times more likely to require hospitalization if they contract the disease.

Severe illness means that a person with COVID-19 may require intensive care and/or a ventilator to help them breathe.

Protect yourself by wearing a mask when interacting in public areas (see page 12 for more information on mask safety).

Other ways to help reduce the



spread of the virus that causes COVID-19 include:

- Limit your in-person interactions with other people as much as possible, particularly when indoors.
- Keep space between yourself and others (stay 6 feet away, which is about two arm lengths).
- Wash your hands often. If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60-percent alcohol.
 - Avoid touching your eyes,



nose and mouth with unwashed hands.

- Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or the inside of your elbow. Then wash your hands.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and things you touch often. How to Protect Yourself:

If you start feeling sick and think you may have COVID-19, get in touch with your healthcare provider within 24 hours.

Happy Holidays Neighbor! takes aim at senior isolation

With the holiday season rapidly approaching, the Orange County Board of Supervisors is calling on residents to safely connect with their elderly neighbors amid the COVID-19 pandemic. Happy Holidays Neighbor! is a public-awareness micro-campaign targeted at raising awareness of the dangers related to senior isolation and suggesting ways everyday citizens can reach out and make a difference.

"No one should be alone during the holidays," said Chairwoman Michelle Steel, Second District supervisor. "The Happy Holidays Neighbor! microcampaign connects seniors with local neighbors who can provide help and support."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website, there are many public health risks linked to social isolation and loneliness.

With one-fourth of adults aged 65 and older considered to be socially isolated, this makes seniors more susceptible to serious medical conditions, such as dementia and heart disease. The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic threatens to further cut off seniors from regular social engagement as well as limit their ability to access needed food, supplies and medication. During the holiday

period, seniors face additional challenges related to gift buying, mailing packages and decorating their home exteriors.

"Seniors are among the most at-risk for contracting CO-VID-19, which is why many have chosen to isolate themselves for the past nine months," said Vice Chairman Andrew Do, First District Supervisor. "Because of this, seniors have never felt more isolated than they do now. Reaching out to a senior neighbor, in a safe way, can help reduce their loneliness and anxiety. The County's Office on Aging provides many handouts and other resources to help you get started."

"It's all about taking action," indicated Supervisor Donald Wagner, Third District. "One call, one errand, or one holiday connection can be the difference in making this holiday season special to a senior."

The Happy Holidays Neighbor! public awareness microcampaign suggests ways to connect and support seniors this holiday season in a COVID-safe manner that focuses on physical distancing but still maintain a social connection.

It features a printable postcard that neighbors can fill out and send to local seniors, asking what assistance they need and providing the neighbor's contact information. Additionally, the micro-campaign provides information about county and local senior resources that are important during the holiday season.



The Gospel of Luke, Chapter 23, Verses 33-34, reads, "And when they had come to a place called Calvary, there they crucified him, and the criminals, one on the right hand and the other on the left. Then Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do.' And they divided his garments and cast lots."

The Holy Bible speaks a lot about forgiveness and forgiving. The Greek word for "forgive" means "to send away." Here, we get the idea of "to set free, to let go, to release, to discharge, or to liberate."

We could easily say to just forget, which means "to lose out of mind, implying neglect or forgetfulness." But things we forget come back to remembrance sometimes. Forgiving goes beyond just forgetting; we must "send it away," never to be found again.

Psalm 103:11-12 says, "For as the heavens are high above the earth, so great is his mercy toward those who fear him; As far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed (forgiven) our transgressions from us."

the earth? How far is the east from the west? Both are immeasurable, and that is how far he has removed (forgiven) our transgressions. This gives us a clear picture of God's mercy, grace and love for those who fear him, meaning those who believe and have faith in him. He has "sent away" their transgressions, never to be found.

Many Scriptures speak on the subject of forgiveness. Let's take a look at a few:

Jesus said in Mark 11: 25-26: "And whenever you stand praying, if you have anything against anyone, forgive him, that your father in heaven may also forgive you your trespasses. But if you do not forgive, neither will your father in heaven forgive your trespasses."

Colossians 3:13 says to "bear with one another, and forgive one another, if anyone has a complaint against another; even as Christ forgave you, so you also must do." Just as Christ forgave those who crucified him, so we to are forgive those who trespass against us.

Ephesians 4:32 reads, "And be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you."

God through Christ forgave us of our sins or transgressions.

1 John 1:9 puts it like this, "If How far are the heavens above we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteous-

Just as God forgives us of our sins against him through his son, Jesus Christ, and takes away the hostility that separated us from him, we are to forgive each other, thus taking away the hostility and anger that exists between those with unforgiving hearts.

Earlier, I mentioned that to forgive gave the idea of "to liberate." When we confess our sins to God, he liberates us from the bondage of sin, bringing victory to us over that which held us in bondage.

The same is true with us. When we forgive those who have transgressed against us, we are liberating both ourselves and them from the hostility that separates us from each other. With God, all things are possible, even the ability to forgive.

We just celebrated Thanksgiving and are headed toward Christmas; what better time to extend forgiveness to those who have transgressed against us, sending the transgressions away, never to return.

As one author says, many unsaved "try to be thankful to God for temporal benefits, but their utter failure to appreciate the gift of his son leaves them most unthankful in his sight."



As we begin the annual reading of the Christmas story, we recall that the prophets testified of the coming Messiah, a descendant of King David who would deliver his people. Revelation teaches that the longanticipated Messiah was the great Jehovah of the Old Testament, who took upon himself a body of flesh and came to earth as Jesus Christ.

This month's "Come Follow Me" study recalls that Jesus showed himself unto the brother of Jared, Mahonri Moriancumer. Recorded in Ether, Chapter 3, Christ declares, "Behold, I am he who was prepared from the foundation of the world to redeem my people. In me shall all mankind have life, and that eternally, even they who shall believe on my name."

So faithful was the brother of Jared that "the Lord said unto him: 'Because of thy faith thou hast seen that I shall take upon

me flesh and blood; and never has man come before me with such exceeding faith as thou hast.' The Lord showed himself unto him, and said: 'Because thou knowest these things ye are redeemed from the fall; therefore ye are brought back into my presence; therefore I show myself unto you. Behold, I am Jesus Christ. I am the Father and the Son. They who shall believe on my name shall become my sons and my daughters.'

"All men were created in the beginning after mine own image. Behold, this body, which ye now behold, is the body of my spirit; and even as I appear unto thee to be in the spirit will I appear unto my people in the flesh."

With this knowledge of Christ, we who take upon us Jesus' name feel in the Christmas season that same anticipation that the Israelites must have felt in anticipating the Messiah's coming.

Today, we listen to carols that speak of his birth and feel joy in his promise of peace on earth and goodwill to men. As believers did in the early days of Christianity, we decorate our homes with colorful wreaths of holly and ivy. With their sharp leaves and red berries, the holly and the ivy remind us of the crown of thorns worn by Jesus Christ on the cross and the drops of blood he shed for us in Gethsemane.

The tradition of giving and displaying decorative wreaths dates back to the Roman Empire and St. Augustine, who spread "good tidings of great joy." To many, the holly represents the baby Jesus, and the ivy represents his mother, Mary. That circle of holly and ivy, which endure through winter, emphasizes the gift of eternal life given to us by our savior.

May the symbolism in our seasonal decorations, the carols we sing, and the gifts we share remind us of he whose birth we celebrate. As we celebrate this sacred holiday, may we be as faithful as Mahonri Moriancumr. May we he did, gain a perfect knowledge of God, believe on his name, and be brought back into his presence.







PEACE- God blessed us with peace through his son, "so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world" (John 16:33).

Drive-Through COVID Testing

The Orange County Health Care Agency offers free COVID-19 tests at two super sites: the Orange County Fairgrounds and the Anaheim Convention Center. The PCR tests are free, but appointments are required via https://360clinic.fulgentgenetics.com/. People will need to wear a mask and bring ID and confirmation of the appointment (printed out or via smartphone). Attendees may arrive up to 15 minutes prior or after, but after this window, they must reschedule. At the appointment, expect to complete a brief medical assessment prior; the test itself involves self-swabbing the inside of the nose. Results are emailed up to three days later.

CDC says community use of cloth masks helps control the spread of COVID-19

The novel coronavirus discovered in 2019 (COVID-19) is primarily transmitted by respiratory droplets generated when people cough, sneeze, sing, talk or breathe. This is why the CDC recommends community use of non-valved, multilayer cloth masks to reduce the emission of virus-laden droplets. It's especially relevant for asymptomatic or presymptomatic infected wearers who feel well and may be unaware of their ability to infect others. These people account for more than 50 percent of transmissions, it is estimated. Face coverings also help reduce inhalation of infected droplets by the wearer. The community benefits from everyone using masks consistently and correctly.

Multilayer cloth masks block not only the release of exhaled respiratory particles into the environment, but also the microorganisms these particles carry. Cloth masks effectively block most large droplets, as well as the exhalation of fine droplets and particles (also often referred to as aerosols), which increase in number with the volume of speech. Such masks can both block up between 50-70 percent of these fine droplets and particles and limit the forward spread of those that are not captured. An 80 percent blockage has been achieved in human experiments that have measured blocking of all respiratory droplets, with cloth masks in some studies. These masks are performing on par with surgical masks as barriers.

Some studies also demonstrate that cloth masks reduce wearers' exposure to infectious droplets. Multiple layers of cloth with higher thread counts have demonstrated superior performance compared to single layers of cloth with lower thread counts. Some materials, such as silk, have also been found to help repel moist droplets and reduce fabric wetting, thus maintaining breathability and comfort.

As COVID-19 is still a new virus, the data regarding the effectiveness of community masking are limited to observational and epidemiological studies. But a recent investigation into a highexposure event in which two symptomatically ill hair stylists interacted for an average of 15 minutes with each of 139 clients during an eight-day period found that none of the 67 clients who subsequently consented to an interview and testing developed an infection. The stylists and all clients wore masks in the salon as required by local ordinances and company policy.

And a study of an outbreak aboard the aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt, an environment notable for congregate living quarters and close working environments, found that the use of face coverings onboard was associated with a 70 percent reduced risk.

Seven studies have confirmed the benefit of universal masking in community-level analyses: in a unified hospital system; a German city; a U.S. state; a panel of 15 U.S. states and Washington, D.C.; as well as both Canada and the U.S. nationally. Each analysis demonstrated that, following directives from organizational and political leadership for universal masking, new infections fell significantly. Two of these studies and an additional analysis of data from 200 countries that included the U.S. also demonstrated reductions in mortality.

Adopting universal masking policies can help avert future lock-downs, especially if combined with other non-pharmaceutical interventions such as social distancing, hand hygiene and adequate ventilation.

WHO recommends physical activity at every age

The COVID-19 pandemic means that many of us are staying at home—and sitting down—more than we usually do. But at a time like this, it's very important for people of all ages and abilities to be as active as possible.

Just doing light-intensity physical movement, such as walking or stretching, will help ease your muscles and improve blood circulation and muscle activity.

Regular physical activity benefits both the body and mind. It can reduce high blood pressure; help manage weight; and reduce the

risk of heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes and various cancers—all conditions that can increase susceptibility to COVID-19. It also improves bone and muscle strength and increases balance, flexibility and fitness. For seniors, activities that improve balance help to prevent falls and injuries.

Regular physical activity can help give our days a routine, and it's good for our mental health, reducing the risk of depression, cognitive decline and delay the onset of dementia, as well as improving overall feelings WHO recommends all adults older than 18 should do at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity or at least 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity physical activity throughout the week. For developing and maintaining musculoskeletal health, musclestrengthening activities involving major muscle groups should be done on two or more days per week. Adults with poor mobility should do physical activity to enhance balance and prevent falls on three or more days per week.

Eight crafty ideas for a brightly lit Hannukah

The Festival of Light officially begins at sundown on Dec. 10, so to gear up for those eight cozy days and nights, we present some DIY Hannukah décor ideas.

Menorahs: The centerpiece of every Hanukkah is, of course, the menorah. The nine-armed candelabrum recognizes the eight nights the candles burned during the rededication of the Second Temple, though the oil should have only lasted one. This gave Judah Maccabee and the other Jews participating in the ritual time to find more. The ninth candle, the shamash or helper, is used to light the others and is traditionally offset. There are several easy methods for making your own menorah.

In honor of the miracle of the oil, you can make a menorah using small jars or votive holders and household olive oil. Pour an equal amount of water into eight vessels, topping each with an eighth to half an ounce of olive oil. Carefully drop a floating wick into each one. You can use a birthday candle in a miniature bottle for the shamash.

To incorporate gift-giving, wrap a trinket or candy (e.g., a dreidel, chocolate coins, etc.) in eight small boxes. Wrap each one in festive paper, then, using double-sided tape, attach a tealight candle to the top. Use a slightly larger, empty box for the helper candle.

Luminaries: Recycle aluminum cans into a glowing adornment. Pour water into an empty

can, then place it in the freezer. Meanwhile, draw a Star of David or other traditional design onto a piece of paper that's about the same width as the can. Once the water is frozen, tape the design to the can, and using a hammer and nails, punch the design into the can. After you empty the can and let it dry, you can spray paint it. Once it's as you want it, you can place a candle inside the can and watch your pattern take shape on the walls

A simpler option is to poke holes into thick craft paper that will fit around a Mason jar or tall vase. Use Modge Podge or a spray adhesive to attach the pattern to the glass.

For a subtler reminder of the seasonal light, you can make a winter-inspired candle holder using Epsom salt, food coloring and a glass jar. In a small bowl, mix a good amount of the salt with a few drops of blue food coloring. Remove some of the salt, placing it on a clean sheet of paper or paper towel. Mix another couple of drops of the food coloring with what remains in the bowl to get a deeper shade of blue, then transfer the leftovers to the same sheet of paper or paper towel. For an extra layer of color, add some undyed salt to what you already have. You can arrange the salts in an ombre pattern or mix them randomly. Spray adhesive onto the outside of the jar, or spread a layer of Modge Podge or white glue. Roll the jar in the salt, covering as much of the glass as possible. You can add salt by hand to any empty spots.

To set the design, spray with a clear sealant.

Garland: Paint popsicle sticks silver and/or blue, then glue into triangles. Arrange triangles into Stars of David, then glue into place. Thread thin white ribbon or string through the stars, then hang as décor. It can be as long or as short as you like. You can supplement this simple garland with clothespins also painted blue and/or silver that can be used to hold the Hannukah cards you receive or pictures of loved ones past and present.

Hanukkah tree: Repurpose your thankful tree from last month, or find yourself some small branches. You can leave them natural or spray them with silver or gold paint. "Plant" the branches in a jar or other small vessel filled with decorative glass pebbles or rocks. Hang small dreidels (available at most dollar stores) and chocolate gelt as decoration. (This is a small, tabletop version of a more expansive Hanukkah bush.)

Bonus craft: If you're mailing Hannukah presents, consider decorating the outside of a large envelope to represent a menorah, then placing smaller envelopes with warm wishes or tiny gifts inside. Or, for slightly larger gifts, use a poster tube for the outer container. Craft paper and glue are easy to cut and paste into a menorah, or if you are using a box, you could fashion the sides to resemble a dreidel.

As with any holiday, it's equally important to remember why we celebrate as it is to have fun with it.



The maximum size allowable for tabletop displays is 24 inches wide, 24 inches deep and 36 inches high. For floor displays, it's 36 inches wide, 36 inches deep and 72 inches high. And for hanging displays, it's 36 inches by 36 inches.

Excess cardboard can be dropped off in the designated area on the east side of Clubhouse 6. Anyone needing more building materials is welcome to take from this area.

Individual entries, as well as collaborative efforts made by GRF clubs or departments, should be brought to the LW Library by Jan. 14, 2021, between 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Projects will be judged based on originality and the use of cardboard. The first-



second place gets \$500, and third place \$250. Special category winners will be awarded prizes valued between \$50-\$100.

Creations will be featured in a drive-through display on Jan. 15, 2021, near Clubhouses 3 and 4 and Veterans Plaza.

Legendary arts program hosts online gala

The arts have been hurting

this year. Since March, art galleries, community theaters, musical venues and more have been closed to the public, unable to share their creativity or support themselves. Some have pivoted to provide online entertainment and education, but it is still a struggle.

But difficult times call for innovation. Sponsored by Stephen R. Davy Violins, the Ritz-Carlton Laguna Niguel, Partners Bank of California and Yamaha, the Festival of Arts in Laguna Beach's gala is moving online. "With cancellation of the summer's show and events, we have been brainstorming on how to support our organization in a fun and entertaining way," says Pageant of the Arts Director Diane Challis Davy. "So we thought, like many other arts groups, why not have an event online instead of our annual celebrity party? 

LWer finds a simple tweak for bathroom remodel

David Camp was one of the many recipients of the City of Seal Beach's Bathroom Accessibility remodel program. He says he loved the work that was done in his bathroom, but he found that the molded seat was still too low for some people with certain disabilities. He figured out a simple and easy-to-assemble solution by using a shower chair to raise the seat's height.

Those who want to try Camp's tweak will need one roll of electrical tape, waterproof tape (Gorilla brand is recommended), scissors and a shower chair. The materials can be purchased at Walmart or any hardware store, and the shower chair can be purchased from a medical supply that carries the "Drive" brand (recommended) or any shower chair that has removable rear legs to have short rear stubs.

Once you have all of the supplies, follow these simple steps:

- 1. Remove rear legs from shower chair
- 2. Remover the rubber feet from rear legs
- 3. Tape the rubber feet to the seat stubs where rear legs were once attached. (the feet will loosely fit on the seat stubs).
- 4. Wrap electrical tape around the seat stubs until the feet can slip over them with a fairly tight fit. Use the waterproof tape to tape the feet in place. Position them on the seat stubs so they sit flat
- 5. Holding the seat, rest the feet on a flat surface and twist them until they sit flat before taping into place.

Once completed, the shower chair should raise the original

seat height around 6-inches and its back will grant better access to the two grab bars installed. Be sure to periodically check the chair and tape's stability before getting into the shower; change the tape when it weakens.

Holiday scams to watch out for

While holiday celebrations will look very different in 2020 as people seek out a balance between celebrating and staying safe, one tradition isn't going anywhere: online scams.

Only a few scams are specific to the holidays, but the most popular ones are normal fraud schemes looking to take advantage of the busy buying season. Since most of the country will likely shop online to help reduce the possibility of contracting COVID-19, scammers will try to trick bargain hunters with fake social media posts, fake websites, or impersonating major brands in your email inbox.

Here are a few possible scams to look out for, according to www. AARP.com:

Charity scams: One-third of all charitable giving is done in December, fundraising software company Network for Good reports. Which means more sham charities exploiting people's goodwill via fake websites and pushy telemarketers.

Delivery scams: As holiday packages crisscross the country, scammers send out phishing emails disguised as UPS, FedEx or U.S. Postal Service notifications of incoming or missed deliveries. Links lead to phony sign-in pages asking for personal information or to sites infested with malware.

Travel scams: Despite the pandemic, nearly 2 in 5 Americans plan to travel during the holidays in 2020 a survey by mobile-booking app maker Hopper found (the CDC recommends avoiding unnecessary/ non emergency air travel to reduce the current surge of coronavirus cases). Spoof booking sites and email offers proliferate, with travel deals that look too good to be true and probably are.

Although it might seem daunting to shop online while knowing scammers are out there, here are some simple things you can look out for that will show you if sites are real or a scam:

- Huge discounts on hot gift items (like expensive electronics selling for only \$50, prices way below the Black Friday or Cyber Monday sales), especially when touted on social media posts or unfamiliar websites.
- Spelling errors or shoddy grammar on a shopping website or in
- A shopping or travel site does not list a phone number or street address for the business and offers only an email address or a fill-in contact form.
- A site does not have a privacy policy.
- An unsolicited email asks you to click on a link or download an app to access a deal or arrange a delivery.

The best way to make sure that you aren't being scammed while you online shop is to make sure you double check the brand's spelling on it's website, and avoid deals that are way too good to be true.

Orange County will cast votes for new OC Board of Supervisors seat early next year

This has been one of the most difficult years. in recent U.S. history. An editorial in the Los Angeles Times said that "the pandemic revealed that an employment-based healthcare system can crumble when it's most needed; that warehousing our elderly is not just unkind, but deadly; that our social safety nets have been dangerously frayed by the complacency of a long economic expansion; and that policies that perpetuate racial and economic disparity are still deeply embedded in our society."

Nevertheless, there are reasons to be thankful as the year winds down. The 2020 General Election is finally over, at least as far as Orange County goes. As of Nov. 25, there were only 17 ballots left to be counted. Every contest has been decided, even the one in which the challenger won by a single vote. One and one-half million people (87.3 percent of the county's registered voters) cast their ballots at vote centers, by mail, or by use of drop boxes. This turnout was 25 percent higher than in the 2016 presidential election. Both President-elect Joe Biden and Vice President-elect Kamala Harris will finally start receiving the president's daily intelligence brief, marking another step toward a transition of power. All elements of the Democratic Party at the national level appear to be working with one another.

However, as much as we might want to take a vacation from the political scene, elections are not over for Leisure World residents. Orange County residents will be voting again in late February or early March to replace Republican Michelle Steel as the District 2 representative on the Orange County Board of Supervisors.

Republicans have had a monopoly on county government for over 30 years, but with a 44,644vote advantage over Republicans in District 2, Democrats have the numbers to change that. As they prepare for this upcoming election, Democratic Club members and an expanded list of supporters mobilized during the last few months will focus on lessons learned during the recently completed General Election.



Military use during times of unrest

President Trump's plan to use federal agents and even the military to deal with riots this past year was reminiscent of an event in the Eisenhower administration in 1957, over 60 years ago.

While Republican President Dwight Eisenhower was not faced with protests and riots in several cities at one time, he did deal with a problem in a high school in Little Rock, Arkansas.

The school was being racially integrated in response to a Supreme Court decision handed down three years earlier.

About 60 years before that, in 1896, the court had ruled in Plessy v. Ferguson that "separate but equal" public facilities such as railroad cars, schools, restaurants, and even toilets and drinking fountains were permissible

In Brown v. Board of Education (1954), the court ruled unanimously that segregating the schools was unconstitutional.

Newly appointed Chief Justice Earl Warren, formerly the Republican Governor of California, ruled that school segregation violated the equal protection clause in the 14th Amendment. The clause says that "No state shall... deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."

In response to the court order, the Little Rock Board of Education ordered the gradual integration of the schools, starting at the high school level. Gov. Orval Faubus ordered the National Guard to prevent the nine Black students who had registered at the school, called the "Little Rock Nine," to attend.

Federal Judge Ronald Davies ordered the governor to back down. On Sept. 21, President Eisenhower sent in 1,200 members of the U.S. Army's 101st Airborne Division from Fort Campbell, Kentucky, to enforce the judge's order by escorting the students into the school on Sept. 25, 1957.

For those unfamiliar with military history, the 101st Airborne is the most decorated military unit in the history of the United States. The movie "Band of Brothers" was based on their exploits in World War II.

Although the Little Rock Nine were repeatedly victimized by white students at the school, they set the stage for the integration of schools throughout the country.

Any Leisure World resident who has trouble stepping into the shower for any reason is probably eligible for a free bathroom upgrade.

The Leisure World Bathroom Accessibility Grant converts the tub/shower combination into a shower-only unit for safer access.

The program is made possible through a grant from HUD, Orange County and the City of Seal Beach. To qualify, applicants must be over 55 years of age and have an annual income as follows: One person, \$71,750; two people, \$82,000; and three people, \$92,920.

"Many residents get confused on the application process," said Monique Miner, program administrator. "Others don't realize you can have substantial savings and still qualify for the free upgrade. We are just a phone call away and can help residents apply for the completely free upgrade. But don't delay completing your application because funds are limited."

when the Japanese attack on the American naval base began in

The entire event will be livestreamed on Pearl Harbor National Memorial's Facebook page and at www.pearlharborevents. *com* in partnership with Defense Media Activity.

"America's obligation to honor its veterans has been a sacrosanct pillar of our society, and we encourage everyone to join us virtually for this important ceremony," said Scott Burch, acting superintendent of Pearl Harbor National Memorial.

THE ATTACK

On Nov. 26, 1941, the Japanese Imperial Navy ordered an armada that included 414 planes aboard six aircraft carriers to set to sea, according to national WWII museum.org. Following a plan devised by Adm. Yamamoto Isoroku, who had earlier studied at Harvard and served as Japan's naval attaché in Washington, D.C., the flotilla aimed to destroy the U.S. Pacific Fleet base at Pearl Harbor.

To catch the Americans by surprise, the ships maintained radio silence throughout their 3,500-mile trek from Hitokappu Bay to a predetermined launch sector 230 miles north of the Hawaiian island of Oahu.

At 6 a.m. on Sunday, Dec. 7, a first wave of Japanese planes lifted off from the carriers, followed by a second wave an hour later. Led by Capt. Mitsuo Fuchida, the pilots spotted land and assumed their attack positions around 7:30 a.m. Twenty-three minutes later, Fuchida broke radio silence to shout, "Tora! Tora! Tora!" (Tiger! Tiger! Tiger!)—the coded message informing the Japanese fleet that they had caught the Americans by surprise.

The unsuspecting American ships were moored in pairs along Pearl Harbor's "Battleship Row." For nearly two hours, Japanese firepower rained down upon American ships and servicemen.

While the attack inflicted significant destruction, the fact that Japan failed to destroy American repair shops and fuel-oil tanks mitigated the damage.

Even more significantly, no American aircraft carriers were at Pearl Harbor that day. The Japanese, however, immediately followed its Pearl Harbor assault with attacks against U.S. and British bases in the Philippines, Guam, Midway Island, Wake Island, Malaya and Hong Kong. Within days, the Japanese dominated the Pacific.

In Washington, a decrypted message had alerted officials that an attack was imminent moments before Fuchida's planes took to the skies.

But a communications delay prevented a warning from reaching Pearl Harbor in time. The Americans missed another opportunity when an officer discounted a report from an Oahu-based radar operator that a large number of planes were headed their way.

According to history, Roosevelt learned of the attack as he was finishing lunch at the White House.

He spent the remainder of the afternoon receiving updates and writing the address he intended to deliver to Congress the following day asking for a declaration of war against Japan. As he drafted and redrafted the speech, Roosevelt focused on rallying the nation behind a war many had hoped to avoid.

- Number of COVID-19 cases in nearby LA County have reached historic highs
- Number of reported cases in Seal Beach have escalated in the last week alone by 17, a 5 percent increase)
- Based on the above, there is now a 1 in 72 chance of being infected (363 reported cases as of Monday)

If you are infected with COVID-19 in Seal Beach, there is a 1 in 9 chance of death, according to the OC Health Care Agency.

Public health and safety guidelines must be followed. People who are infected with COVID-19 must comply with public orders, including quarantine requirements.
