IN MEMORIAM

Shirley Reimers served on GRF Board for 19 years

Shirley Reimers, director on the Golden Rain Foundation (GRF) Board for more than 25 years, died Oct. 26, 2022, in Jamestown, California. Mrs. Reimers, who was six months shy of the century mark, bought her Mutual 3 home in 1975 and lived in Leisure World until April 2021.

She was one of the longest, if not the longest, serving GRF Board member in LW history, having served 19 consecutive years from 1994-2013. At age 90, she lost her seat to former GRF President Linda Stone.

In addition to serving as president, she chaired every major board committee, including Finance, Physical Property, Recreation and Communications, among others. She served on the Physical Property Committee for many years, most notably chairing the committee that built Clubhouse 6, which opened on the site of the demolished A-frame in July 2003. She was also instrumental in helping purchase the LW Library from

Orange County in 1995, a year after the county declared bankruptcy.

She was a legend in her own time. She had a Mona Lisa smile, a belly laugh that would infect everyone around her and an endless affability. But at her core, she was principled, plain spoken and direct, even blunt, some would say.

She believed in the power of diversity and community participation to foster independence and security. In addition to service to the GRF, she was instrumental in the Golden Age Foundation, was a board member for the MultiCultural Council in the late 2000s and joined the Kiwanis Club in 1991 in its heyday when the international service group had a large and robust LW membership.

For 46 years, she sang in the Redeemer Lutheran Church choir and loved it. It was a lifelong love: "When I was a boy, at Bethany Lutheran Church, she did not hold back," son Peter Reimers said. "The entire church knew where she was

Leaders work to make emergency preparedness a priority in LW

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers were a major presence at the recent Emergency Preparedness Expo in LW.

Recognizable in their green vests, 12 volunteers helped a large crowd of LW

residents learn how to help themselves in an emergency before first responders arrive.

CERT raffled off donated prizes for emergency supplies that included: a GoBag, a pet carrier and a case listing important information worn on a lanyard around a person's neck.

Marty Williams handed out the prizes at 11 a.m. and again at noon.

CERT President Catherine O'Brien and CERT instructors Fara McCartney, LaVerne Haller and Rich Carson along with GRF Health and Safety Specialist Eloy Gomez answered

residents' questions and handed out information sheets.

Volunteers David Friedland and Cynthia Stone distributed whistles and emergency contact information for police

and fire departments.

In the case of an emergency, like an earthquake or house fire, CERT volunteers have

been trained to respond first to their own well-being and that of their immediate household, and then to report where they are needed.

Working in teams with a buddy, CERT volunteers learn how to safely investigate a situation, perform triage, put out small fires and do basic first aid.

There will be opportunities for residents to be CERT-trained in the new year. Also, residents will be invited to attend open informational meetings starting on Jan. 27 from 10-10:30 a.m. where practical, hands-on safety tips will be featured.

CAP FOOD

Distribution will be outside CH 4

Free food is available in Leisure World to eligible residents who are 60 years or older through Community Action Partnership of Orange County (CAPOC), which has a monthly distribution site by Clubhouse 4.

The next food distribution will be Nov. 17.

Every third Thursday from 9-11 a.m., qualified people receive 40 pounds of food, including canned fruit, vegetables, meat, rice, juice, cereal and more. The pick up location and process for the food bank is going back to the pre-pandemic method. Park, check in and pick up food at the Art Room.

Eligible seniors must live in Leisure World, be at least 60 years of age and meet income guidelines as follows: up to \$1,354 a month for one person; \$1,832 for a two-person household; and \$2,311 for a three-person household.

To sign up, bring a photo ID and proof of income (Social Security/SSI statement, letter or bank statement or paycheck stub).



The Golden Age Foundation (GAF) recently donated \$1,500 to Meals on Wheels of Long Beach (MOWLB). The check will cover the daily fee for residents in need.

MOWLB began delivering to the Leisure World community in 2013. Over the past nine years, staff and volunteers have been honored to serve the amazing residents of Leisure World.

Every weekday, two freshly prepared meals—a hot dinner, complete lunch, dessert, and a beverage—are delivered to LW program members with a friendly visit and wellness

check. Deliveries are made by caring and trained community volunteers. Volunteers provide a valuable social connection for those home-bound residents who are isolated and alone. The goal for MOWLB is to help clients remain safe, socially connected and nourished at home for as long as possible.

The program is available to all Leisure World residents who have difficulty preparing or shopping for meals due to the aging process, illness, recent surgery, or a chronic health condition.

Donations from the GAF

are directed to residents in need, covering the daily fee for qualified, low-income residents.

The GAF is an independent nonprofit, 501(c)(3) charitable organization dedicated to serving the residents of Leisure World. Its purpose is to make the community a better place to live. The GAF was established in 1973 and is not affiliated with the Golden Rain Foundation.

Because the GAF has been recognized as a nonprofit organization by the Internal Revenue Service, in most cases contributions made to it qualify for exemption from income taxes.

Battery recycling returns on Nov. 15 in CH 2

The Golden Age Foundation (GAF) has been funded the Battery Recycling program for many years. In 2021, the GAF recycled over 3,000 pounds of batteries last year. This year, the GAF had to halt the program since the cost of recycling jumped from less than a \$1 per pound to over \$4 per pound.

The GAF is happy to announce it has found a more affordable solution. The GAF will collect batteries for recycle on Tuesday, Nov. 15, from 9:30–11:30 a.m. in the parking lot of Clubhouse 2. The GAF hopes to provide this service every quarter, similarly to its shredding service.

The GAF will accept these batteries:

- Alkaline
- Carbon Zinc
- Nickel Cadmium (NiCd)
- Nickel Metal-Hydride (NiMH)
- Lithium Ion (Li-Ion)
- Lithium Metal
- Silver Oxide

• Button cell batteries and all other dry cell batteries

Accepted batteries include all household batteries, cell phone and laptop batteries and small, button-type batteries.

The GAF asks residents to place each lithium battery in a separate baggie to align with recycling requirements.

The GAF believes it is important to keep waste fees low and keep the planet clean by recycling batteries instead of throwing them in the dumpster. It is happy to provide a service within Leisure World for residents to use.

Note that this service is for Leisure World resident's personal household batteries only. The GAF asks people not to bring batteries from businesses.

WATCH YOUR STEP

Avoid these delivery scams over the holidays

Americans spent \$211.4 billion online over the 2021 holidays, according to retail research company Digital Commerce 360. That was up 10% from 2020 as consumers continued to gravitate toward the ease and convenience of e-commerce. Scammers love the trend, too: they've developed myriad tricks to take advantage of the proliferation of packages, especially during the holiday season.

The primary ploy is a phony delivery notification, a scam that really ramped up amid the pandemic. People would receive an email or text message that claims to come from the U.S. Postal Service or a major delivery company like FedEx or UPS. The message would ask to confirm an order so it can be delivered,

or that an unsuccessful attempt was made to drop off a package and needed to be rescheduled by clicking the link.

The scammer is hoping a person orders so many things online that they can't keep track of all the purchases, or that they'll assume it's a gift from a friend or relative. The link will go to a bogus site that will ask for the person to enter personal or financial data, enabling a scammer to use it for identity theft. The fake site might also be a launchpad for malware that harvests sensitive information from devices.

Delivery scams have become the predominant form of text-message phishing scams. Scammers sent out an astonishing 23 billion messages about faux

deliveries in 2021, accounting for more than one in four spam texts, according to phone-security service RoboKiller.

There are low-tech variations, too. Scammers might call you posing as employees from a delivery service, saying they need a credit card number or other private data to reschedule a drop-off. Or they'll leave a failed-delivery notice on your door with a number to call; if you do, the person on the other end will try to talk you into providing personal information to collect your purported package.

Warning Signs

- You receive an email, text, call or note about a delivery for something you don't remember ordering.

The message urges you to make a payment or provide personal or financial information to facilitate a delivery.

- The message includes misspellings or poor grammar.
- A supposed delivery company email has a sender's address or link with a slightly different version of a business name, such as fedx.com instead of fedex.com.

How to protect yourself

- Be wary of unsolicited phone or electronic communications from a delivery service.
- Keep track of your online orders and their shipping status. Knowing what's coming and when makes it easier to spot fake delivery messages.
- Rely on safe ways to communicate with delivery companies. Call a confirmed customer-service number, or log on to a company's official website and use the chat function.
- Don't click on a link or open an attachment in an unsolicited email or text message that appears to be from a delivery company.
- Don't give out personal or credit card information to a caller. Instead, find and call the company's official customer-service number and ask if they were trying to contact you about a delivery.
- Don't reveal your user ID or password for a delivery company's website to a caller or to anyone else.
- Don't rely on official-looking logos or professional-sounding language as proof of authenticity. Scammers study and copy companies' actual communications to make their ploys look and sound convincing.
- Report suspected package scams to the Federal Trade Commission, online or toll-free at 877-382-4357. If the scam occurred online, report it as well to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center.
- If you receive a suspicious message that claims to be from UPS, forward it to fraud@ups.com for investigation, then delete the message.
- If the message appears to be from FedEx, report it at abuse@fedex.com.
- Forward suspicious U.S. Postal Service emails to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service at spam@uspis.gov.
- For questions about a delivery notice from the U.S. Postal Service, visit its website or call 800-275-8777.





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

Joyce Bachner will introduce this opera, which is perfectly suited for first-time opera goers as it contains the melodies and drama that have marked Georges Bizet's musical work for over 150 years. The story focuses on the love of two men for the same woman and the psychological strength required on the part of one to reach a peaceable resolution.

Act 1 introduces a village in Ceylon where folks are engaged in pearl fishing and have just chosen a leader, Zurga. Among the well-wishers is a young pearlfisher, Nadir, who years earlier had sworn a vow of eternal friendship with Zurga when both men had fallen in love with the same girl, but swore to give up their pursuit to maintain their friendship. Into this village also comes a religious figure, a virginal priestess Leila. By custom, she wears a face covering common to many religious figures but somehow she is recognized by Nadir as his former object of affection.

Act 2 reveals Nadir caught up in his strong attraction to Laila and he pursues her causing alarm to the Brahman religious beliefs of the people and they demand that both transgressors be put to death for their transgression. Their leader Zurga realizes his good friend Nadir has broken their joint vow.

Act 3 presents Zurga coping with this heavy dilemma—facing his own feelings for Laila and the broken vow of Nadir. As Laila comes in to plead for the life of Nadir by sacrificing her own life, he fights with his available options. He ultimately forgives them and sends them off to pursue a life elsewhere, having distracted the townspeople with a fire to which they flee to protect their homes and families.

during hymns or in the choir loft.”

Gil Moore, who pastored Redeemer Lutheran for 16 years and still lives in LW, remembered Mrs. Reimers well. “She was a very faithful member during my entire time as pastor,” he said.

Current Redeemer Lutheran Pastor Lisa Rotchford called her a “cornerstone” of the church and its missions.

Shirley Reimers was born March 18, 1923, in Los Angeles. She and her sister Viola Colleen were raised by their grandmother Eva Viola when their mother Gladys Isabelle separated from their father John Calvin.

She taught fifth grade for more than 20 years for the Los Angeles School District in the town of Cudahy.

“It was demanding work,” Peter said. “She was very satisfied having made a difference in the children’s lives.”

In 1949, she married Walter William Reimers. They divorced in 1974 and neither remarried. The couple had three sons.

She made all the newspapers when, at 93, she got lost on the

way to the Long Beach Airport and ended up in Mexico. Peter alerted Seal Beach police that she had not picked him up on March 15, 2016.

It turned out that she was more than two hours away by the side of a busy road in Tijuana. A good Samaritan found her next to her crashed Buick near the U.S. border fence.

Maya Martin, a 34-year-old housewife, brought Mrs. Reimers to her house in Tijuana. From there, they called her distraught son.

But pinpointing her exact location proved problematic, as the Martin’s house had neither a street address nor a land telephone line.

Martin was asked to go to the Seal Beach Police Facebook page, and do a “pin drop.”

With that information, the U.S. Marshals Service helped contact Tijuana police, who went to the residence and took Mrs. Reimers to the San Ysidro border crossing.

At the border, with help from San Diego police and the California Highway Patrol, she was delivered to Seal Beach police,

who drove her home to safety.

Mrs. Reimers, who attributed her confusion to a medical condition, was shaken by the experience but grateful to have received the kindness of many strangers.

It could have been divine payback for her selfless life, always poured out to help others. A deeply religious woman, she accepted all. Faith mattered to her.

“Shirley was a loyal friend to many people across a wide spectrum of humanity,” Peter said. “Her underlying drive was related to a phrase she added to the prayer before meals at the family table: and make us always mindful of the needs of others.”

She lived in LW for 46 years and loved it.

In a 2012 OC Register story on LW’s 50th anniversary celebration, Mrs. Reimers was quoted as saying that LW was “the best place that mature adults could be living. You have security. You have recreation. You have privacy, if you want it. You have everything you really need.”

“Her mission was to keep

LW safe and all its services affordable,” said Harbir Narang, who was the GRF administrator from 1986 until his retirement in 2005.

He vividly remembers Mrs. Reimers because she was everywhere: “I admired her courage, her ability to serve, her tenacity. She asked the tough questions,” he said. “She treated people with respect and understanding. She was always there for Leisure World. She was fantastic.”

Peter agrees: “If she differed in opinion, she either held her tongue, prayed or lived another of her phrases, ‘oh well.’

“For the most part, she accepted people as they are. She once told me how boring the world would be if everybody thought and behaved like I did. Variety permits us to see differently, should we choose?”

“Many residents express pleasure when they tell me stories about my mom,” Peter added. “A great one is, ‘She was always happy.’”

Shirley traveled to Hawaii for visits with her sons, Alaska and Italy (among others) with her good friend Bonnet Winter, who

she met at LW, and to Austria with her grandson.

She was preceded in death by her ex-husband, Walter William Reimers (1987) and sister Viola Colleen (1989).

She is survived by three sons, Peter W. (Wendy), Walter W. Jr. (Pamela) and Paul T. (Melissa), 11 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

A Memorial Moment will be incorporated into the regular service at Redeemer Lutheran Church on Sunday, Dec. 4, at 10:30 a.m.

The church is located at 13564 St. Andrews Drive in Seal Beach.

Ample parking is available across the street.

There will be a fellowship time after the service, either indoors or out (weather permitting). Cake will be available.

In lieu of flowers, Mrs. Reimers would love to have laughter, kindness, acts of charity and the courage of conviction as goals for daily life, Peter said.

Masks are recommended. Doing so is a choice to protect others from illness.
