SECURITY UPDATE

Citation program recommences on GRF trust streets

As of June 1, Security will use new Community Violation Notices (CVNs) to document parking violations inside Leisure World.

The enhanced system will streamline the prior heavy administrative burden on the Security and Finance Departments.

At this time, the enhanced citation program will be enforced on GRF Trust property only. The GRF Board of Directors will provide direction to Security at a later time regarding authorization to issue citations on a Mutual's property.

These citations cover parking violations only. The Seal Beach Police Department is responsible for issuing moving violations inside Leisure World.

There are no assigned "parking enforcement" officers in Security. Parking enforcement will be conducted by patrol officers when there are no other duties of higher priority occurring in the community, such as paramedic calls, incident reports, etc.

E-bikes pose unique risks to riders

ver the past few years, electric bikes have grown in popularity as a fun, energyefficient way to get around the community while offering some health benefits. Despite being an affordable and flexible form of travel, new reports highlight a surge in accidents and dangers associated with these types of motorized vehicles that can result in severe injuries, such as broken bones, spinal cord and head injuries.

The Department of Motor Vehicles defines an ebike as a bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor. Most e-bikes fall into one of three types.

Class 1 e-bikes, the most common, are pedal-assist models with motors that work only while someone

is pedaling. They have a top speed of 20 mph. Ride faster, and the motor automatically flips off.

Class 2 e-bikes feature a throttle, so the motor powers the bike even if a person isn't pedaling. It stops working if a person exceeds 20 mph, though.

Class 3 e-bikes are the most powerful. These pedalassist bikes can reach 28 mph before the motor stops.

Electric bikes are much heavier than traditional bikes because they contain a battery and an electric motor, weighing anywhere around 30-80 pounds.

According to an article by the Washington Post, some dangers come with owning or using electric bikes, and it's essential to be aware of them. Because of weight and speed, e-bikes pose a greater risk of injury to riders and pedestrians. A Reuters report found that e-bike injuries were more than three times as likely

Residents can start getting their medications delivered by Genoa whenever they like. Genoa has a pharmacy in an Optum site in Torrance, where they send out free, daily medication deliveries straight to residents' doors.

Medications are also delivered in pre-filled packaging (pictured), so people don't have to worry about missing a dose.

Genoa pharmacists and technicians are highly trained in chronic conditions that many people have, like diabetes and heart disease, making them a great resource for information about medications.

Those who would like to sign up for Genoa's medication delivery can stop by the HCC front desk or call Genoa at 424-282-2035. They're open from 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday though Friday.

to involve a collision with a pedestrian than either scooter or traditional bike injuries. Those injuries were more serious than with other types of motorized vehicles such as scooters and conventional bikes, according to recent studies.

Fire and safety officials are also warning that consumers need to take precautions with electric bikes after an increase

in battery fires linked to the devices. Lithiumion batteries, the type used to power e-bikes, have been found to overheat and catch fire under certain conditions, especially if they are not charged or disposed of properly. Last year, New

York fire officials reported over 75 e-bike fires, which caused multiple injuries and three deaths. Last month, an ebike's battery burst into flames while charging in a New York restaurant, which injured one firefighter.

Consumer Reports recently outlined some tips fire officials have offered to stay safe:

• Purchase and use devices that are certified by a qualified testing laboratory.

• Always use the manufac-

turer's cord, and power adapter explicitly made for the device.

• Store batteries away from anything flammable.

• Do not leave e-bikes unattended while they're charging, and don't leave them charging overnight.

• Do not block your primary way into and out of the building with an e-bike.

In many e-bike accidents,

the braking system was reported to have caused heavy vibration, metal to metal grinding and inability to bring the bike to a complete stop.

Duetoe-bikes' heavier weight, combined with greater speeds, the wear and tear on the braking

system is much greater as the brake pads might wear out up to 75% faster than those in traditional bikes. Don't forget to inspect e-bike brakes or have them serviced at a professional e-bike repair shop on a regular basis.

Electric bike accident injuries are often devastating for victims. Along with the immense physical and emotional pain and suffering these injuries can cause, victims often incur tremendous medical expenses and a lowered quality of life after the incident. Wearing a helmet may reduce the impact of such injuries. Currently California law requires Class 3 e-bike riders of any age to wear helmets; however, it is good practice to wear a helmet when riding any type of bike.

People who are planning on purchasing an e-bike or have not used an e-bike in some time should practice riding in an empty parking lot or other open, traffic-free space to practice starting and slowing the e-bike. An e-bike's acceleration can startle new riders, as can the distance required to fully stop, and the weight that could contribute to a loss of balance.

Remember to be considerate and courteous when riding. The pedestrian always has the right of way. An e-bike, like any regular bicycle, is a vehicle and is required to follow all roadway rules and regulations:

• Act like a car, be predictable and visible.

• Wear bright or reflective clothing.

• Look out for other roadway users and never assume they will see you especially at intersection.

• Use the e-bike's bell or politely say "on your left" when passing.

When a citation is issued, the violator can instantly pay online or pay in person at the finance office—which will have all the citation information on its computers. This information can be found on the back of the citation.

There are two ways a violator may appeal their citation:

1. In-Person—The appeals board meets the third Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. in Conference Room A, located

At the May Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) safety meeting, 40 residents learned how to prepare for a power outage and how an outage could affect the Leisure World community.

CERT President Catherine O'Brien did a great presentation on how to stay safe when a power outage threatens a person's safety. People are highly encouraged to have emergency lights, which stay plugged in and go on when the power goes out. The greatest danger in a power outage is falling, especially in the dark. Therefore, it is a necessary to have a reliable source of light available in case a person must to get up in the middle of the night.

Other practical tips included: always have flashlights and batteries on hand in each room, keep freezers and refrigerators closed, disconnect appliances and electronics to avoid damage from electrical surges and use alternate plans for refrigerating medicines or power-dependent medical devices.

The first hour of the group's monthly safety meeting is open to all residents. These meetings will now include a drawing to give away a safety item. This month's winner was Alice Chung.

The LW CERT group wants to give a special shout-out to thank the LW Women's Club for giving the group a generous donation, which will be used to buy safety items as giveaways. CERT will meet Friday, June 23.

SBPD adds community-oriented patrols

The Seal Beach Police Department's Community Oriented Policing (COP) Team will be deployed for the summer season. This two-officer team will patrol throughout the city, Main Street and the beach area in anticipation of increased crowds and summer activity. The team will be deployed from Memorial Day through the Labor Day weekend.

Community policing is the collaborative partnership between the police and the community to identify and solve community problems and proactively address the immediate conditions that give rise to public safety issues such as crime, social disorder and the fear of crime. Through community policing, all members of the community become active participants in the problem-solving process alongside the police to deter crime and enhance quality of life of all residents and visitors to the city of Seal Beach.

The two officers selected for this assignment were chosen because of their proactivity and dedication to the City of Seal Beach. Their primary objective will be to help keep the most trafficked areas of Seal Beach safe by being a uniformed presence and by preventing crimes. The officers will patrol on foot, in cars, on bicycles and in off-road vehicles.

"We normally see a large increase in tourists to our city during the summer months because of our beautiful beaches, popular Main Street, and excellent weather," said Seal Beach Police Chief Michael Henderson. "But this increase in population also creates an increase in potential criminal activity. By dedicating these two officers to patrol our busiest areas, our goal is to ensure the safety of residents, visitors, and businesses."

Although the COP Team will deploy from the Police Substation at the base of the pier, they will respond to emergencies throughout the city and address quality of life issues in all neighborhoods. They will also act as liaisons between the police department and businesses and will participate in community education events.

Our legal advisors recommend all residents of Mutual 1 create a trust because:

• In California, if the value of your estate is less than \$166,250, a will is all that is required to distribute assets to your heirs quickly.

• As a resident of Leisure World, your estate value is greater than that.

• Your estate must go through the "probate" court process. Having a will does not do what you likely intended it to do.

• Probate in California currently takes about 22 months. The courts are backlogged, particularly after the pandemic.

• Legal probate fees vary with the value of your estate. They are typically between \$10K and \$15K, sometimes more.

Get the picture? Real estate taxes, landscaping fees, water fees, amenities fees and all the other Leisure World fees continue to accumulate, to be deducted from the estate's value when probate is finally complete. Your heirs receive nothing for months; your estate value continues to erode dramatically. Your unit remains locked up, unoccupied.


Trusts make distribution much faster and less expensive overall. Yes, the cost of a will typically is less than a trust, typically \$400-\$700 for a will. In the current edition of the Leisure World paper, one lawyer advertises a simple trust cost is \$699 for a single; \$899 for a couple. It can be more. Browsing one web page article, expect between \$2,000-\$4,000.

The evidence is clear. Do yourself a favor; call an estate attorney and ask. It's to your (and your heirs) benefit.

BATHROOM ACCESSIBILITY

Most LWers eligible for free grant remodel program

Leisure World residents who have trouble stepping into the shower for any reason are likely eligible for a free bathroom upgrade.

HUD has increased the income limits for the LW bathroom grant program, so more people qualify and their is double the funding to help for the next six weeks.

"Nearly everyone who has completed an application has gotten the \$4K-plus improvements on their bathrooms for free," said Monique Miner of CivicStone, the company that the City of Seal Beach employs to administer the grant program.

To qualify, resident households must meet certain guidelines. Savings do not disqualify you. All applicants must be over 55 years of age and have a gross annual household income less than or equal to new income limits, which allow for a maximum gross annual income of \$80,400 for a one-person household; \$91,850 for a two-person household and \$103,350 for a three-person household.

CivicStone has also added electronic signing to the process to aid ease of application.

For nearly two decades, the City of Seal Beach has run the Seal Beach Bathroom Accessibility Program to help residents of Leisure World modify their bathrooms making them easier for seniors to use.

The units in Leisure World were built in the 1960s, before ADA regulations were established. As a result, the fiberglass tub/shower combinations can be a challenge for seniors to use. The funding from the County of Orange and HUD is used to modify these fiberglass units to make them more accessible to the residents for free.

How is it done? The side wall of the existing fiberglass tubs are cut to just a few inches from the floor. The tubs are then refinished with a new coat of fiberglass to look like new, and a custom glass shower door is installed. The process converts the tub/shower combination into a functioning shower. The grant funds can also be used to build an in-shower bench, add grab bars and/or replace an existing toilet with a high-boy toilet.

The bathroom improvement process is coordinated by CivicStone (www.civicstone. *com*), a company hired by the City of Seal Beach to review all applications and manage the construction improvements with the approved contractors. Once approved for the program and scheduled for work, the improvements usually take less than a week to complete.





File of Life at Copy Medicare Basics: FAQs, coverage and more

When it comes to emergency, it is important to know the difference between the ER and urgent care and their nearest locations.

Urgent care centers are available when the primary care physician is not available, and ideal for non-emergency care such as cough, sore throat, body aches, colds, sinus infections, allergies, eye irritations, muscle sprains, nausea, vomiting or diarrhea.

Emergency rooms are for life threatening or disabling conditions such as stroke, heart attack, severe injuries from an accident, a loss of consciousness, uncontrolled bleeding, poisoning, or sudden severe abdominal pain.

Most Medicare Advantage plans cover ambulance services at a reduced rate. However, the original Medicare plan will only cover 80% of the Medicare approved ambulance charge. Medicare Part B covers the cost of an ambulance in emergency situations if the trip meets the following criteria:

- Ambulance is medically necessary.
- It's the only safe way to transport the patient.
- It's going to a Medicare-approved location such as hospital, skilled nursing facility or back home after care.
- The destination is the nearest qualifying facility available to provide the treatment.
- The transportation company meets the Medicare standards.

Most Medicare plans include yearly routine annual eye exams that can detect heart disease, diabetes and more.

Most Medicare plans include some dental care, which is one of the most expensive healthcare items. Dental care can detect things like cancer, nutrition issues and osteoporosis, just to name a few. To confirm the coverage, people can call their preferred dentist and find out about their accepted dental plans.

People with certain disabilities and a licensed assistance dog may be eligible to receive \$50 a month from the State of California. For more information, call 916-657-2628 or go to www.cdss.ca.goc/ assistance-dogs.

When it comes to vaccinations, Medicare covers vaccinations against shingles, tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), hepatitis A and B, flu shots, pneumococcal and covid and more. According to the Inflation Reduction Act, beginning in 2023, adult vaccines recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are free for Medicare beneficiaries with prescription drug coverage. Whereas people need to have a Medicare Advantage plan that includes Part D prescription drugs, or a stand alone Part D prescription drug plan to get free vaccines. However, one in 11 Medicare beneficiaries do not have a prescription drug plan therefore they will have to pay for certain vaccines.

Some may not see a need in a prescription drug plan right now because they don't take any medications, but as mentioned above, Part D prescription drug plan covers more than just everyday medications. If people don't sign up for a Part D prescription drug plan when you they first take Medicare, they'll be subject to a late enrollment penalty if they decide to sign up for a plan later. Certain exceptions apply.

Looking for authentic, homestyle, Indian cuisine? Flamin Curry hits the spot. A short drive from Leisure World down Westminster Boulevard, turn right at The Toledo, and take the first left onto Broadway, which brings you to Flamin Curry. A few doors past Redondo Avenue, you'll see its yellow-orange awning on the left. I have been looking for good Indian food and found the place: a small takeout restaurant with casual inside dining and high quality, freshly made everyday fare. Naveen, the owner, is careful where he purchases fresh vegetables and doesn't freeze or use frozen food. They grind their own spices, and don't buy ready-made spices. Nor do they use food coloring, gluten, preservatives or msg. They use fresh ginger, garlic, onions, tomatoes and a lot of love. Sanjeev, the chef, used to be the chef for Carnival Cruise Line.

Prices are very affordable at \$12.99 for a three-item combo meal. All combos are served with rice and naan (delicious flat bread). The menu is extensive: veggies, chicken, goat and fish curries, tandoori oven items, drinks, desserts and extras. You can spice it up or down, the way you want it, according to your palate, on a la carte orders, while combo setups are mild.

My friend from LW and I ordered three item combos. She delighted in the goat curry, chicken tandoori, and palak paneer (spinach and cheese) dish, while I went for chicken and eggplant-potato curries, and palak paneer. I felt satisfied and happy, with ample leftovers for take home. This place is an old fashioned and popular spot, with excellent cuisine fit for everyone to enjoy.

Community Church

Last week, during Trinity Sunday, Pastor Johan Dodge shared how the concept of the trinity is difficult to understand. The trinity is one God in three expressions: God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Centuries ago, there were church arguments over the nature of God and the ability of God to change (or not change) and thus there were arguments over what became the doctrine of the trinity.

This week, Community Church will look at an equally vexing word—mercy. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says: "Go and learn what this means, 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have come to call not the righteous but sinners." The group will look at the command of Jesus for mercy this week.
